

#### **GOT MONARCHS?** from Mary Mohr



The recent article in the LA Times presents seven things gardeners can do to improve the dwindling numbers of the Western monarch butterfly. Why is this so important? First off, caterpillars are a critical food source for most songbirds, which rely heavily on the insects to feed their young. Second, butterflies, like bees, are important pollinators. Adult monarchs sip nectar from many blossoms, and as they flit among flowers, they are also spreading pollen, helping the plants produce seeds, which also feeds birds and other wildlife and, of course, help the plant to reproduce. And third, butterflies are just plain beautiful. These are all important reasons to do our part to protect and increase the numbers of our amazing butterflies.


As we look to spring and summer planting, here are things we can do as individuals:

- First and foremost is to rip out the showy tropical milkweed (deep orange flowers) you thought were helping and replace it with the native milkweed, generally available in nurseries in April. Some nurseries have stopped selling the tropical variety recognizing that the parasites they produce in their all-year growing cycle weakens adult monarchs, messing up their migration patterns, mating success, flight ability and lifespan.
- When buying native milkweed, like narrow-leaf milkweed, California milkweed and wollypod milkweed, be sure it's ORGANIC and native to your growing area. When it's organic, that means that the grower has not used systemic pesticides, which are toxic to any caterpillars that eat them. Aphids are a common pest to milkweed and may look unsightly to you, but they do not harm the plant or caterpillars. A strong stream of water can rid them if needs be.
- Use your voice and start asking for native milkweed at your nursery and don't buy the tropical variety. Nurseries will respond. Since native milkweed is not available all year because it's dormant, ask for seeds.
- Plant lots of nectar flowers. Adult monarchs happily sip the nectary from many flowers. Among the native nectar plants for Southern California are: black sage, bluedicks, sunflowers, seaside fleabane

and manzanita. Also native buckwheats.

- Don't try to 'rescue' monarchs. Butterflies raised indoors seem to lose their innate navigation system and can't migrate properly. If you raise monarchs, put them outdoors. Also, don't move monarchs from one location to another as it can introduce diseases to the wild population.
- Keep your eye out for monarchs as researchers track the butterfly's overwintering habits now through April 22. Take a photo (blurry is OK), note the date and location and submit your photo by email to MonarchMystery@wsu.edu.
- Lastly, don't use pesticides or herbicides in your garden. Milkweed used to grow wild in agricultural areas and alongside roads. With these chemicals in wide use, both commercially and residentially, much of the monarch's food source has been destroyed. We can do our part and support beneficial insects in our garden as well as in our food supply by lobbying our representatives and government agencies to phase out their use.
