

# GardenFest 2023 Plant Sale and Garden/Household Goods/ Flea Market

Set for Saturday, April 15, 2023 Locals invited to create "funky plant containers" for contest

GardenFest 2023 will be held from 8 am to 2 pm on Saturday, April 15, 2023, at the San Clemente Community Center on Avenida Del Mar at Seville. The San Clemente Garden Club (SCGC) hosts the annual event in partnership with the City of San Clemente Parks & Recreation Department, offering incredible bargains on hundreds of plants with an emphasis on drought-tolerant species.

SCGC members and sponsors propagate and donate a large variety of plants and also flea market items that are useful for gardens, homes and hobbies.

They will be on available for purchase in the community center auditorium. GardenFest also offers gardening and craft activities for children, display and sale of local art, craft demonstrations, displays about bee keeping and butterflies, and tips on water conservation. Master Gardeners will offer free garden tool sharpening.

South County area residents are also invited to enter the annual "Funky Plant Container Contest." Attendees judge winners at the event. Entrees are due by 8 am on Saturday, April 15.

GardenFest proceeds fund horticultural scholarships, programs for junior gardeners and civic beautification.









# **City Tree Workshops** from Patricia Holloway, "The Tree Lady"

San Clemente's Public Works Department held two community workshops in December 2022 to share its current tree care practices and gather input from residents about updating its 20-year-old tree policy. Several garden club members attended the meetings to comment and ask questions. Here are some things we learned:

- The city has about 15,000 trees located on public property including street trees, park trees and trees found at public facilities including the Community Center, City Hall and Casa Romantica.
- The city has a certified arborist on staff who recommends planting a wide variety of trees to reduce the spread of pests and diseases.
- The city contracts with West Coast Arborists for tree maintenance.
- According to the program iTree, the city's tree coverage is approximately 21%, which includes trees on both public and private property.
- Although maintenance crews work year-round, staff is trained to avoid and/or halt pruning trees that harbor active wildlife or nesting birds and revisit them later.
- The city adheres to International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) tree pruning standards to maintain healthy trees. Following these best practices means never "topping" trees, which causes permanent damage and destabilizes the tree. Best practices also necessitate leaving at least 30% of a tree's foliage after trimming so it can properly photosynthesize.
- By far the largest share of the city's tree care budget is spent on tree maintenance (\$290,000), which includes pruning, watering, insect and disease management. Out of 15,000 trees, about 2,000 must be pruned annually, with the remaining trees on a much longer trim cycle.
- According to the city's Tree City USA application, the city removed 38 trees, but planted only 25 in its most recent budget cycle.

The overall sentiment of residents at the workshops was how can we support and encourage the city to plant more trees to expand our urban forest? One way would be for community members to participate in the city's **April 28 Arbor Day** tree planting. Another would be to attend council meetings and send emails in support of budgeting more resources not only for maintenance, but for tree planting. # **Gardening and Mental Health** from Susan Pierce

Recently I read an article about gardening and its relationship to chronic and mental health.

A controlled trial of community gardens found that physical activity, such as puttering in the garden and intake of fiber reduced the risk of mental illness, chronic disease and levels of stress. Those gardeners in low-income households had the greatest reduction in mental health issues.

The study was conducted in Denver and Aurora, Colorado. It generated about 300 gardening beginners whose average age was 41. These persons were divided into two groups. One group was assigned to a community gardening group and received a plot in the community garden, seeds to plant, a study partner and introduction to gardening. The other group was assigned to a control group. All participated in completing questionnaires about diet, mental health and body measurements.

After two seasons, the gardening group was eating much more fiber daily than the control group. The seven-percent increase in fiber intake had noticeable positive effects on those gardeners' health. Being together in a natural space with others and learning about gardening noticeably improved the quality of life of the gardeners.

I am sure that San Clemente Garden Club gardeners can attest to feeling great after a few minutes gardening. Pulling weeds is a stress reliever, and watching your seeds transform into beautiful flowers or a bounty full of fruits and vegetables is quite rewarding to one's self esteem. Eating food that you grew is a healthy way to live. Help yourself to maintain good health by wearing a mask and gloves and wetting down the potting soil. These measures help prevent any potting mix that might be contaminated from blowing up in the air and being inhaled.
