- 1. Scientists are using the mechanics of owl wings to design aircraft and wind turbines to be more silent.
- 2. The elk population in Yellowstone became uncontrollable because there was no longer an organism at the top of the food chain to control their numbers. Wolves have been reintroduced to reestablish the food chain.
- 3. Science is trying to conserve the Monarch Butterfly forest in Mexico. This holistic approach should assist natural regeneration where the environment no longer allows it to occur.

On Arbor Day the City of San Clemente made *The* Lorax proud by planting 22 trees including 10 native Coast Live Oaks and 4 New Zealand Christmas Trees at Forster Ranch Community Park, and elsewhere around town. The tree planting ceremony was the result flowers were in full bloom, and every attendee of friendly cooperation between the city and several nonprofit groups.

Thanks to our San Clemente Garden Club, Citizens' Climate Education, Sunrise Rotary and San Clemente Rotary for collectively donating \$4,500 to the city to purchase these trees. High praise is also due Public Works Director Kiel Koger, Maintenance Manager Randy Little and Arborist Steve Fritzsch for organizing a safe and professional event, and for applying, with the blessing of our City Council, to become a Tree City U.S.A. Mayor Duncan happily announced at the event that San Clemente has been granted Tree City status by the National Arbor Day Foundation. This is good news for our town and a vital step toward making us a healthier and more beautiful community.

What's a rose garden without roses? One could ask the that question of the small plot of land at **Max Berg Park** with the marker stating 'Memorial Rose Garden, San Clemente Post 423.

The original Veteran's Memorial Rose Garden was developed by the **San Clemente Military Council** in 1950. As per the Sun Post article from the 1980s, the plaque is **American Legion Post 423**. The original garden was planted by the **VFW post** in 1950. The roses memorialized San Clemente residents who lost their lives in WWII. **Rosa 'Peace' shrubs** were added in 1970 and dedicated by then **First Lady Pat Nixon**.

The original **Veteran's Memorial Rose Garden** (VMRG) was removed during the park renovation in the 1980s. The 'Peace' roses that First Lady Pat Nixon dedicated were dug up and transplanted around the City, City Hall, City Golf Course, and a City Council member's home. Over the years, **Jim Gatacre** and his wife **Pat** purchased and planted nine 'Peace' rose shrubs in the remaining VMRG. Jim's father died in combat in 1942 and Pat's father fought in and survived the Battle of Okinawa. The roses pay tribute to their fathers and all those who have sacrificed for their country.

The City decided to remove anything that could hide a person after a shooting incident in the park in the summer of 2022, so there we were with a lovely marker and no roses. The local **Historical Society**, the American Legion Post 423, and several folks who live in the neighborhood of the park decided to take action. The City was contacted and eventually added irrigation to several beds bordering the existing pavilion and adjacent to the existing marker. Jim Gatacre generously donated shrubs that are all consistent with the theme of peace and remembrance. Our Garden Club volunteers rallied in record time to dig the holes for the new shrubs. Soon, we will have a beautifully blooming Veteran's Memorial Rose Garden!

Also, because of the rain, we witnessed first hand how litter and other nasties come straight out to the beach through the storm drains, and right where the surfers are surfing--gross!




Garden Tour 2023 from Kim Neal

Tree City USA Guest Opinion by Patricia Holloway



Last fall, the City of San Clemente applied to the National Arbor Day Foundation to become a Tree City USA. Communities seek this special designation for guidance in expanding their Urban Forest.

To qualify, a city complies with four standards:

- 1. Establish a Tree Board
- 2. Enact a Tree Ordinance
- 3. Budget for Tree Care
- 4. Celebrate Arbor Day

Based on a recent inventory, San Clemente maintains 15,000 public trees. Currently, the city removes more trees than it plants. We must help reverse this trend. Trees have it rough. Between



prolonged periods of drought, disease, vandalism, storm damage and old age, it's not easy being green! Together with trees on private land, the city's canopy coverage is 21%. This is less than the national average of 27% and that of neighboring cities.

This Arbor Day gives us an opportunity to turn things around by fostering a culture of care for trees. The Garden Club, Citizens' Climate Education, and both Rotary Clubs are donating time and treasure towards helping San Clemente plant large trees at Forester Ranch Community Park. Come by at 9:00 am, Friday, April 28th to join the action.

People ask what they can do to support trees in their yards and neighborhoods. Here are some answers:

- **Protect mature trees.** Mature trees are at their peak environmental powers. Their leaves absorb CO₂ and release oxygen; their shade cools the air and ground; well-developed root systems draw water to the surface in dry times and retain water in wet times; they provide wildlife habitat, improve human health, and increase property values. They're beautiful!
- Don't top or severely prune trees. Topping causes permanent damage and weakens limbs. Also, no more than 25% of a tree's foliage should be removed at once. Without leaves a tree cannot feed itself. This shortens its lifespan.
- Water trees, even during drought. Trees are exempt from water conservation restrictions, so please water trees even when constrained in watering your lawn or shrubs.
- Water new trees weekly. Apply 15-20 gallons of water, especially in hot weather. Create a moat around the tree 2-4 feet away from the trunk. Turn hose on low and measure how many minutes it takes to fill a 5-gallon bucket. Multiply that by 3 or 4 and leave the hose trickling in the moat for that length of time.
- Water mature trees monthly. Place hose by drip line (where tree's canopy ends). Water slowly to a depth of 18 inches.
- Replace trees. If you must remove a tree, buy a new one to take its place. If a tree is removed on your street or HOA common area, ask the city or HOA to replant one in an appropriate location.
- **Support funding.** Ask Council to allocate additional dollars toward planting trees in its annual budget. Trees are the only "infrastructure" to increase in value over time.

By planting trees on Arbor Day and throughout the year, San Clemente will enlarge its village forest and truly become a Tree City USA.
